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Records Of The Militia And

Most military records are on paper or microfilm and copies will need to be mailed to you. They are not typically available to view online. Records of military personnel who separated from the military: Less than 62 years ago are federal (non-archival) records. More than 62 years ago are archival records.

Military Personnel Records The National Personnel Records Center, Military Personnel Records (NPRC-MPR) is the repository of millions of military personnel, health, and medical records of discharged and deceased veterans of all services during the 20th century. The surviving records can be divided between two timeframes, namely before and after the Militia Act of 1757. After the English Civil War (1642-1651), the raising of a militia was suspended until the Militia Act of 1757. The origins of the militia date back to Anglo-Saxon times when the force was known as the fyrd.

Nineteenth century. A separate voluntary Local Militia was created in 1808 before being disbanded in 1816. By 1813 the British Army was experiencing a shortage of manpower to maintain their battalions at full strength. Some consideration was given to recruiting foreign nationals, however on 4 November 1813 a bill was introduced to parliament to allow Militia volunteers to serve in Europe.

There is a fee for records that are considered "Archival," which depends on the discharge date. If the request is made 62 years after the service member's separation from the military, the records are now open to the public and subject to the public fee schedule (44 USC 2116c and 44 USC 2307).

Military Records - Public Records Search

Military records are potentially of great genealogical value and may provide information not found in any other source. These records identify individuals who served or were eligible to serve in the military. Military service (other than the militia) was usually a lifetime career.
