Hanyu Pinyin is the official system to transcribe Mandarin Chinese sounds into a Latin alphabet. It was invented in 1950s, and adopted as a standard in mainland China in 1958.

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were created by combining two components: a phonetic component on the rebus principle, that is, a character with approximately the correct pronunciation.

The Chinese traditionally divide the characters into six types (called liu shu, “six scripts”), the most common of which is xingsheng, a type of character that combines a semantic element (called a radical) with a phonetic element intended to remind the reader of the word’s pronunciation.

One Chinese sound is associated with one syllable and each Chinese character has its own pinyin syllable. There are three parts in a pinyin syllable, which are the Initial, Final and Tone. General writing systems all analyze the linguistic form into constituents of meaning or sound. Chinese script is primarily a logographic script; each word or morpheme is represented by a single graph or character. Two words, even if they sound exactly the same, will be represented by entirely dissimilar characters.

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
